Pope Francis Encourages Knights of Columbus in Works of Charity and Witness to Authentic Nature of Marriage, Life and the Rights of Believers.

Pope Francis praised the charitable works of the Knights of Columbus and encouraged the organization to defend the sanctity of marriage, the dignity of life, the beauty and truth of human sexuality, and the rights of believers.

The pope's sentiments are contained in a letter of greeting to the Knights' 131st annual convention, now taking place in San Antonio.

The letter, which was sent by Vatican Secretary of State Tarcisio Cardinal Bertone on behalf of Pope Francis, expressed the Pope's "esteem for the ideals of faith and fraternity embodied by your Order, its commitment to the Church's mission, and the many works of charity and evangelical witness undertaken by the Knights in their local Councils, parishes and communities."

The letter also encourages Knights to continue their witness, saying, "Conscious of the specific responsibility which the lay faithful have for the Church's mission, [Pope Francis] invites each Knight, and every Council, to bear witness to the authentic nature of marriage and the family, the sanctity and inviolable dignity of human life, and the beauty and truth of human sexuality."

"In this time of rapid social and cultural changes," the letter continues, "the protection of God's gifts cannot fail to include the affirmation and defense of the great patrimony of moral truths taught by the Gospel and confirmed by right reason, which serve as the bedrock of a just and well-ordered society."

On religious liberty, the letter conveys the pope's "appreciation of the clear public witness offered by the Knights of Columbus in protecting the right and duty of believers to participate responsibly, on the basis of their deepest convictions, in the life of society."

The letter, which underlines the specific responsibility which the lay faithful have as part of the Church's mission, was directed to more than 2,000 attendees consisting of Knights and their families from dozens of countries gathered in San Antonio from Aug. 6-8 for prayer, business planning, recognition and fellowship. More than 100 members of the Catholic hierarchy, including 11 cardinals, are also attending this year's convention.

The convention's theme, "Be Protectors of God's Gifts," is drawn from Pope Francis' inaugural homily delivered in March.

"At the close of a year in which we set new records for charitable contributions and worked very closely with the Church, the Knights of Columbus is grateful for the support of our Holy Father," said Supreme Knight Carl Anderson. "And we look forward to continuing to serve our Holy Father, the Church and those most in need."

In Service to One, in Service to All

In observance of the Year of Faith, Catholics from throughout the East Coast will gather in pilgrimage, sponsored by the Knights of Columbus, on Sunday, Sept. 8, 2013, at the Basilica of the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception in Washington, D.C. Popularly known as 'America's Catholic Church,' the Basilica is the patronal church of the United States and its preeminent Marian shrine.

The date is also the 50th anniversary of the dedication of the Basilica's 56-bell carillon, which was a gift of the Knights of Columbus.

The pilgrimage begins with Mass at noon, followed by exposition of the Blessed Sacrament, recitation of the Rosary and renewal of the Order's consecration to the Blessed Virgin Mary. Benediction and a carillon recital will conclude the activities at approximately 3 p.m. Confessions will be available from 10 a.m. to noon.

The Year of Faith is designed to renew the faith of Catholics so that we will be credible, joy-filled witnesses to the Risen Lord in the world today, capable of leading others to faith.

The goal of the Year of Faith is to foster a deeper practice and witness of faith, as well as a deeper understanding of the truths of our faith that Jesus — the foundation of our faith — revealed. To do this, Catholics are encouraged to participate regularly in the sacraments, advance in personal prayer, participate in pilgrimages to sacred sites and improve their knowledge of the Church's teachings, particularly through study of the Catechism of the Catholic Church.

The Knights of Columbus has a long history with the National Shrine. The K of C provided \$1 million for the construction of the campanile, known as the Knights Tower, which was dedicated in 1959. Four years later, the organization donated a carillon of 56 bells. On the day of the dedication (Sept. 8, 1963), Archbishop Patrick O'Boyle of Washington said, "To the members of the Knights of Columbus, in the name of the bishops of the country, I say we are deeply grateful for this wonderful gift. Long after we are gone, this tower and these bells will be paying honor to God and to his Mother."

The K of C also established a \$1 million endowment in honor of Past Supreme Knight Luke E. Hart to promote Marian devotion at the National Shrine and to preserve and maintain the Basilica. For more than 30 years, Knights have funded, coordinated and staffed an usher ministry there. Since 1989, the K of C has regularly funded televised liturgies and other spiritual broadcasts from the Basilica. Most recently, the

Knights donated \$1 million for the installation of a mosaic depicting the Incarnation of Christ in the Great Upper Church.

The 131st Supreme Convention held in San Antonio, Texas on August 6-8, 2013 was a tremendous success. Its theme was "Be Protector's of God's Gifts," a line chosen from the inaugural homily of Pope Francis. Supreme Knight Carl A. Anderson said: "For over the past year you have been good stewards of God's gifts! Our Order is stronger today than ever before, and, my brother Knights, the best is yet to come."

At the Supreme Membership Seminar for Knights of Columbus at the convention, Supreme Knight Carl A. Anderson said that the Order has a "historic opportunity" with the election of Pope Francis. Since his election in March, the pope has "captured the imagination of the world" through his simplicity of life, pasto-ral manner, and calls for Catholics to engage in personal service to the most needy and forgotten of society. "He is going to lead a tremendous renewal of Catholicism, especially in the Western Hemisphere," Anderson said. Knights are called as individuals and as an Order to stand "shoulder to shoulder" with the pope to "advance a great chapter of Catholicism in our lifetime."

The supreme knight also said that to live up to its reputation as "the strong right arm of the Church," the Order must grow in numbers. More members mean more charitable works, more needy people helped and a greater ability to assist the Church at the local, diocesan and universal levels.

The message from the Supreme Knight Carl A. Anderson is clear - - let us offer the Experience of a Lifetime, membership in the Knights of Columbus, to every eligible Catholic man so that we too can be proactive as "Protector's of God's Gifts."

In addition, there are many fun activities including music, swimming, hiking, sports, arts and crafts, movies, parties. dances, and a talent show.

For many, Camp GLOW provides the only vacation they will have during the year. It also provides a respite for parents whose sons or daughters live at home.



REFLECTIONS

Lawrence P. Grayson *The Power of One*

America was established as a great experiment in human liberty, based upon a belief in the worth and dignity of the individual person. The Founders provided a vision in the Declaration of Independence, and set forth a means for assuring liberty through self-government in the Constitution. In the latter document, they allowed for the election of representatives and established a limited, self-checking government through the division of powers. But declaring a belief and order-ing it through an organizational structure is not enough – it must be sustained. When asked what type of government was created by the Constitution, Benjamin Franklin is reputed to have said, "We have a Republic, if we can keep it."

If liberty is to be maintained, it requires a populace which has and lives by moral and virtuous convictions. Without a national sense of virtue, without trust that each of us will do his or her duty and will act in honorable ways, without a belief that decisions for the community will be based on the common good and not on individual self-interest, a republic cannot continue to exist. History has shown this on many occasions. If America is not to suffer the fate of the great republics of the past, and vanish to become simply a lesson in history, than the citizens of this country have to understand and live by the principles and values that form its foundation. "To suppose that any form of government will secure liberty or happiness without any virtue in the people," James Madison said, "is a chimerical idea."

Rights are not protected by written documents, but by the beliefs, habits, and actions of people who respect liberty, truth, and the value of the human person. If virtue and morality do not guide civic activity, then the original beliefs upon which the nation was founded can be transformed into rationales to justify self-serving actions. As Pope John Paul II said in his encyclical, Centesimus Annus, "As history demonstrates, a democracy without values easily turns into open or thinly disguised totalitarianism."

The Pope expanded on this statement in 1997, when he received the credentials of a newly-appointed American Ambassador to the Holy See. In doing so, he said, "The Founding Fathers of the United States asserted their claim to freedom and independence on the basis of certain 'self-evident' truths about the human person: truths which could be discerned in human nature, built into it by 'nature's God'...The continuing success of American democracy depends on the degree to which each new generation, native-born and immigrant, makes its own the moral truths on which those first Americans staked the future of your Republic. Their commitment to build a free society with liberty and justice for all must be constantly renewed if the United States is to fulfill the destiny to which the Founders pledged their 'lives... fortunes...and sacred honor'."

Today, under the guise of tolerance and with misguided deference, America is slipping into a moral totalitarianism, with the state declaring, by stages, that God has no place in civic life. All public references to God are being banned, abortion is legal and rampant, the traditional definition of marriage is being distorted, and government is forcing individuals to violate their con-sciences and organizations to repudiate their faith-based values. To many people, the religious and moral convictions upon which America was founded now are considered an anathema on a free society.

The principles of virtue and morality, which form the basis for America's republican form of governance, are best taught, strengthened and maintained by religion. The founders of this nation rooted their actions on a belief in a transcendent God, who endowed all of us with certain unalienable rights, and who will hold us accountable for how we fulfill our concomitant duties. As Catholics and Americans, we have an obligation to reinforce in the public ethos the concepts of liberty and patriotism, to strengthen the foundations of virtue and morality which underlie our republican form of government, and to help assure that religiously-informed, moral argument has a vital role in public life.

You may ask, what can I do? The answer is, you can strike a spark.

Many of us have been in a large meeting when, after a speaker concluded his or her remarks, one member of the audience rose to clap, then another followed, then another, and soon everyone joined in. Because one person rose and became a catalyst for others, the speaker received a rousing, standing ovation. That is the power of one.

One middle aged nun, without any business or media operations experience, began a Catholic television network in 1981; today, EWTN spans the globe. One parish priest began a society in 1882 to foster unity among Catholic working men and provide for the families of deceased members; today, the Knights of Columbus has 1.8 million members and continues to grow. One Albanian-born nun gathered a small community of women in 1950 to administer to the "poorest of the poor;" today, the Missionaries of Charity has sisters, brothers and priests operating in 133 countries. That is the power of one.

You can create a spark for the return of Christian values as a basis for public virtue in this nation. Often a spark is quickly extinguished and nothing happens. But on occasion that spark leads to a conflagration. If you believe in the principles on which this nation was founded. If you believe that, under God, this country can continue to be the mainstay for freedom, democracy, and human dignity in the world. If you believe that our government was "instituted among Men, deriving [its] just powers from the consent of the governed," for the purpose of securing "certain unalienable Rights" with which we were endowed by our Creator, then strike a spark for virtue and morality in public life. And, with God's help, see what can happen.
