<u>CHAPLAIN'S MESSAGE</u>

From State Chaplain Reverend Milton E. Jordan's column in the June 2015 Maryland State Council newsletter.

Dear Brothers,

THE QUESTION many receive or ask themselves or others is this: "**How do I find Jesus in a way that brings me to Him more frequently?**" As radio and TV station announcers have said repeatedly since the beginning of the Memorial weekend, "It's time to kick off the summer vacations time." The long days of those "lazy, hazy days of summer" are a perfect time for many to answer "the question." Ruth Haley Barton produced a insightful and practical book, Invitation to Solitude and Silence, that is an excellent response to "the question."

I will offer a few of Barton's helpful insights into life for men and women in a busy world. In essence she reminds us that goals worthy something cannot be achieved in the snap of two fingers. Time, precious time is needed. And this is the gift of summer time. Longer days, brighter evenings. Sitting in the yard or on the porch ... the opportunity to be quiet and alone. She writes that taking time for silence, just sitting still, giving the brain and heart a rest, is an invitation to the very core of our being. It is there that we meet the Jesus who "waits just outside the noise and busyness of our lives."

It is worth having a copy of one part of the Old Testament, I Kings 19:1-19, the story of Elijah and his struggle to hear Yahweh in his own prayer.

Beginning such a journey, like any personal journey of self-discovery, is to know where you happen to be at any moment. Then, if you can honestly see in your heart and mind where you are, then you have to want to progress, to move onward to what you might simply call somewhere else. A question most men might confront is this: What is it that causes me to want to live with a frenetic lifestyle? It is this crazy activity, yes, sometimes necessary, that can lead a man to ask this question: "Is life really meant to be like this?"

If we are honest with ourselves, we might have found ourselves in a situation described by Ruth Barton as the statement of a dear friend: "Ruth, you are like a jar of river water all shaken up. What you need is to set still long enough that the sediment can settle and the water can be clear."

During these summer months we should find time to let the 'river water' of our daily lives settle long enough to produce clear water. Just ten minutes a day, sitting in silence, not trying to figure out a problem, not calling upon God for an answer to the challenges of life, but just ten minutes letting your mind and heart go nowhere. It might require several of these private, quiet sessions with yourself for you to not feel the difficulty of silence. Practiced regularly, these ten minutes can become the key that creates a new spiritual you because, after a short time with this effort, God will speak to you, the Holy Spirit will lead you where God knows you are the best as he created you.

This is but Part I of a June, July, August, September series to help you (and me) develop or strengthen our love of silence because it is there where we find God and God finds us!

Knights of Columbus Supports Military Pilgrimage to Lourdes

For the third consecutive year, Supreme Knight Carl Anderson joined nearly 200 military veterans, active service personnel and volunteers sponsored through the Archdiocese for the Military Services and Knights of Columbus during the 57th International Military Pilgrimage to Lourdes, France, May 15-18.

Prior to the start of the international ceremonies, the American pilgrims were welcomed at a Mass celebrated on Thursday, May 14, at the shrine's Rosary Basilica. In his homily, Bishop F. Richard Spencer, auxiliary bishop of the Archdiocese of Military Services and the episcopal vicar for Europe and Asia, shared the significance of the pilgrimage site which has been "a place of pilgrimage for over a hundred years."

He asked the pilgrims, many of whom were wounded after serving in combat and military duty, to continue to "heed our Blessed Mother's call to conversion of heart so that the world might be a better place for all." Supreme Knight Carl Anderson expressed similar sentiments in an address to this year's pilgrims, as he encouraged the pilgrims to "prayerfully seek God through the intercession of Our Blessed Mother, the celebration of the sacraments and fellowship with military personnel from countries throughout the world.

"Our commitment to veterans and active-duty military personnel has never wavered," Supreme Knight Anderson continued. "We not only provide spiritual support and catechesis to members of our Armed Services, but we also offer scholarship programs for seminarians who will serve as military chaplains. Beginning in 2014, the Knights of Columbus partnered with the Gary Sinise Foundation to help provide custom-built homes for severely wounded veterans. In addition, countless individual Knights volunteer their time to Veterans Affairs Voluntary Services programs throughout the country."

Archbishop Timothy P. Broglio of the Archdiocese for the Military Services was the homilist and main celebrant for Friday's Mass welcoming the international pilgrims. The archbishop was accompanied by several military chaplains, including eight Catholic priests, to further meet the spiritual needs of the pilgrims.

Following the opening Mass, the American pilgrims and volunteer joined veterans from other countries at various ceremonies, prayer services, military band concerts and processions. Among the Knights of Columbus volunteers were Supreme Master Dennis Stoddard and Assistant to the Supreme Knight for Military and Veterans Affairs Col. Chuck Gallina.

The pilgrimage is the latest chapter in the Order's long history of providing hospitality and spiritual resources for military members. During the First World War, the Knights of Columbus Army Hut program assisted members of the military throughout Europe. Immediately following the end of the war, the Order organized the first-ever international military pilgrimage to the Marian shrine at Lourdes.

Since then, the Knights have helped sponsor war relief activities and programs for veterans.

Only having "through work" insurance doesn't work

Do you know anyone whose life or career has been drastically changed during these years of economic downturn? It's very likely that someone in your immediate or extended family or group of friends is facing financial uncertainty now.
